It's interesting to notice in the above referenced temptation that the devil tried to smear the Word of God. He took one of the most beautiful passages of Scripture (Psalm 91:11-12), and SMEARED it for his own purposes. The passage from Psalm 91 tells us that God has angels watching over us, - and that's a very comforting thought for us. The devil tried to smear that passage, just as he smeared the Word of God in the Garden of Eden. "Did God really say ...".

The Word of God is powerful for Jesus during his time of temptation, and it can also be powerful for us in our daily life. The important thing is to always have in our hearts and minds the highest estimation of the Scriptures for our living.

May the Bible always be holy and sacred to us. Let us remember that it is a very important touch stone that God uses to interact with our lives. Let's keep God's Word sacred, and gladly hear and learn it.

Stewardship Committee Development - Dave Schlaack & Jim Whitten have begun working on forming a committee to address our recent financial deficit and plans for future growth. There is concern that the congregation is not truly aware of our current situation. Giving was down substantially in 2016 from 2015 levels. The possible sale of the Parsonage may be reconsidered. We may need to meet with the membership (during announcements?) to explain where we stand on our budget, income and expenses. Further discussion will take place regarding how best to do this.

A presentation was made by Jim Whitten regarding a book "Why Nobody Wants to Go to Church Anymore" that explores research into why church membership doesn't appeal to newer generations. Primary reason is that they don't want to be judged. Churches should find ways to show radical hospitality to non-church-goers in our community to reach those who are reluctant to come to church. A written report is posted on the Council bulletin board.

The committee was expanded to add Don Waker. Jim Whitten will invite non-council members to join also. A follow up meeting will be scheduled with the enlarged committee.

Martin Luther Workshop by Institute of Lutheran Theology. Jim Whitten has contacted St. Thomas Lutheran in Trufant about going together on hosting this workshop in Evart. Jim will work with Pastor Magera at St. Thomas to find a few common dates to pursue with ILT. Since lunch is part of the program Deb Elliott will bring this up with the Women's Group about whether they would be willing to provide lunch. JimWhitten will report back next month.



Hallmarks of Lutheran Identity pt.2

As we look forward to the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's posting of his 95 Theses, it is prehaps helpful to remind ourselves of the beliefs that make Lutherans different from other Christians. The following is the second in a series based on a book by Alvin Schmidt.

Grace: God's Merciful Disposition


Sola gratia – grace alone. Grace means "undeserved mercy, prompted by God's love shown by Jesus Christ. The Greek language has three different words for love. Eros which refers to erotic love, *Philos*, referring to the love between friends and Agape which is the highest, most exalted form of love. Agape, in reality is a love only God is capable of excercising. Yet, God uses the word agape often as the way Christians should love one another. The apostle Paul told the Ephesians grace is the gift of God, not a result of works. Grace is the disposition of God that prompts Him to save all those who repent and believe in His Son, Jesus Christ. The grace of God is always active and present and God's love moves Him to be gracious to those who believe in the merits of His Son's death and resurrection.

Lutheran theology teaches that any and all merits of man are excluded from the concept of grace. God's grace to us relies solely on the merits of Christ. When grace is understood and accepted as being an exclusive quality of God's disposition, a Christian can beabsolutely certain of its validity. If even a small part came from within a person, we would never be sure that we had done enough to merit eternal salvation. The Lutheran doctrine of sola gratia (by grace alone) gives all glory and honor to God.

God's grace for eternal salvation is available to all who confess the name of Jesus Christ as their Lord. From the time of Luther to the

present day, Lutherans believe that God works through means in converting and keeping Christians in His kingdom. The means God uses are His Word and Sacriments. As it says in the Smalcald Articles, "God does not want to deal with us in any other way than through the spoken Word and the Sacraments. Whatever is praised as from the Spirit without the Word and Sacraments – is the devil himself. (SAIII VIII 10). In order for Christians to benefit from His grace, God's Word must be made know to us by the reading and/or hearing of the Word. Another means of grace is available to us through Baptism (God's Word connected to the water). In Baptism, the person by daily repentance and faith in God's promises recieves the grace of God's forgiveness. A third means of grace available to Christians is the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. God's Word in this meal assures repentant Christians that their sins are forgiven when in faith they believe the words,"This is my body given for you. This is my Blood of the covenant which is poured out for the forgiveness of sins."

All who die and receive eternal life receive it only as a result of God's saving grace through faith that accepts and relies solely on the merits of God's only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, who was crucified and raised from the dead for our justification. This doctrine is the core around which the Lutheran Reformation revolved. It is another one of the Hallmarks of Lutheran Identity.



Behind the scenes on Sunday morning

It has come to my attention that some people in our congregation have questions about what goes on in the Pastor's office prior to the service on Sunday mornings and special services. Let me take a moment to explain. An Elder is not only someone who has the spiritual life of the congregation on their hearts but they also serve as a support for the spiritual life of the Pastor. We all expect the Pastor to pray for us and minister to our needs but who prays for the Pastor?

Before a worship service, one or more Elders spend time praying that the Holy Spirit be present in the Word as it is spoken, that God will guide the Pastor in proclaiming the Word rightly and that those who have ears may hear God's message.

As an Elder and the person who prints the bulletins for the services, I have felt a responsibility to regularly be a part of this time of prayer. This time allows me to pray for the Pastor and to give the Pastor a "heads up" should there be changes in the bulletin or if I have left something out, which happens often.

At an Elders meeting recently it was suggested that the Pastor was not the only one whose ministry would benefit from this time of prayer. So we have extended an invitation to song leaders, lay readers, communion assistants, prayer leaders, and any others who make our worship service possible. Everyone is welcome to join us as we pray that our time of worship is pleasing in God's sight.

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
